# **Keeping Them Active**

A typical day at The Community Family includes medical care and monitoring by the nursing staff, providing a small breakfast and noontime meal, and lots of time in-between. This time is filled with activities, both formal and informal. More informal activities may include stimulating discussions such as "remember when" or "this day in history", playing trivia or other interactive games via the It's Never 2 Late computer systems, or having singers come in and entertain for an hour. Bingo is always a favorite of many participants.

Our three centers each host an art program that is both therapeutic and invigorating. Participants create projects that range from simple and appealing to intricate and astounding. Some of the top-notch artwork has been recognized in the past in local competitions.

The Everett and Medford centers have a music therapy program led by a certified music therapist presiding over group sessions of singing or instrument-playing. These programs are very successful in tapping the imaginations and

emotions of participants. Both centers also have exercise programs that, for most participants, is the only form of exercise they receive all day.

The Lowell center stays quite busy themselves with activities ranging from yoga to poetry, a book club and even a bible group. All of the centers have special days with brunches or cookouts or a special theme such as Hawaiian Day or Olympics Day. Holidays are celebrated extravagantly.

The Activities Directors at each of the centers – Merrill Ragusa in Everett, Denise Coco in Medford and Sonia DeJesus in Lowell – are diligent in filling our clients' days with worthwhile, invigorating programming. Each day, they con-

tinue to seek out new and exciting ways to occupy and engage their "club members".

TCF's programs and activities are funded in large part by a generous grant from the Cummings Foundation, as part of their \$100k for 100 Program. The grant was made to The Community Family in 2013, divided into five annual installments. We are grateful to the Cummings Foundation and look forward to receiving their funding for our activities over the next three years.
